The first Regional Lecture of the year will take place in Mayaguez, Puerto Rico on April 21.

Student doodlebugs take to the fields

SEG Field Camp Grants propel students forward with hands-on experience.

One of the best experiences a geoscience student can have is to participate in a summer field camp. These field experiences are designed to introduce students to hands-on geophysical exploration and research. Field camps emphasize teaching of field methods and research related to a variety of basic and applied problems.

One way your Foundation and its donors support the geoscientists of tomorrow is by funding summer field camps like SAGE (Summer of Applied Geophysical Experience) and the Colorado School of Mines Field Camp. Recently, SEG founding father and charter member O. Scott Petty was memorialized through the endowment of the O. Scott Petty Field Camp Grant. Thanks to a generous donation of \$100,000 from the Scott Petty Foundation and matching funds of \$50,000 from SEG, field camp experiences will be available to geoscience students in perpetuity.

Thanks to Richard Degner, President and CEO of Global Geophysical, Inc., the Colorado School of Mines Field Camp has recently received additional endowment funding of \$115,000. Richard personally donated \$65,000 toward this worthy cause and SEG matched an additional \$50,000. When asked why he supports the CSM Field Camp, Richard Degner stated, "I grew up in the industry working on seismic field crews. In order to understand the technical, logistical, and cost aspects of geophysical data, it is essential that young individuals entering the profession spend time learning the field methods."

Recently, your Foundation joined forces with SAGE to kick off a \$1,000,000 endowment. The endowment will be managed by your Foundation and its sole purpose will be to fund SAGE on an annual basis. Scholarship Committee begins process of naming SEG Scholars for 2008-2009 academic year.

With \$448,350 awarded to 172 SEG Scholars world-wide, the 2007-2008 academic year was an exciting time for your Foundation and the geoscience community. In addition, the American Geological Institute recently recognized the importance of SEG scholarship support in their November 29th issue of *Geoscience Currents*. Students face-off for a better SEG.

SEG Challenge Bowl is a win-win for everyone.

No doubt you have already heard about the SEG Challenge Bowl. But how much do you really know about it? Do you know where the idea came from or how important it is to the geoscience community? SEG Past President, Peter Duncan, gives us the scoop on this amazing program.

"The Challenge Bowl idea appeared at a time when several motivational forces were at play. On the industry front, there was much talk of the 'impending crew change' – the graying of the baby boomer generation – and the lack of a new crew to take over. How do we attract students to our industry?

The vision, springing forth from an experience of a geo-trivia contest held at the 2004 SPG conference in Hyderabad, was to create a series of regional student contests around the world that would be hosted by the local SEG affiliate. Regional winners would win a fully paid grant to attend the SEG Annual Meeting and Exposition. There they would meet other students, industry professionals, and experience the full impact of our industry. As well they would compete in an international Challenge Bowl for more prizes and scholarships.

Here is a program that is international in scope, gets local sections involved, attracts student interest, and builds a community of student leaders to contribute to SEG in years to come. All that and it's fun too!" says Peter Duncan.

Now you know why the SEG Challenge Bowl is such an important program for SEG and the entire geoscience community. But how important is this experience for students? One of our first challenge bowl participants, from the Indian Institute of Technology Roorkee, recently told us how the challenge bowl experience changed his life.

"SEG New Orleans Conference was like an eye-opener for me. Because it was the first time I got such an exposure in my life. That exposure made the vision of my life. I met students from different universities from all around the world and big people of the oil industry. I participated in the Student Challenge Bowl and ended up with third position... I met Mr. Bruno Blond from TOTAL during the conference in a student program organized by SEG. Before this experience, I never heard about TOTAL... I appeared for an interview in Paris when I finished my degree. I was selected by TOTAL for the Junior Reservoir Geophysicist Post in Abu Dhabi. At the end, I just want to say one thing. SEG introduced me to the world. That exposure made a vision for my life. SEG transformed a village boy into an International Geophysicist." – Tapesh Kumar Tyagi
